Unusual art at seasons show

CAKES, books, cushions and plants are among the unusual "works of art" which form part of an interesting exhibition now running at the SA Association of Arts' Gallery.

The exhibition is being presented under the title Four — the winds, the seasons. Artist Louis Jansen van Vuuren, who compiled the exhibition by asking a number of artists and craftsmen to provide objects, paintings and pottery on this theme, has four paintings on exhibition.

Christopher Peter put together four flower arrangements while jewellers Christine van Rensburg, Alex Trikl and Claudia Schneider have made special pieces relating to the seasons.

Durban artist Anita Klingenberg made a "Jacket for the Four Winds", while the four kites that Louise Hennigs of Worcester made, fly high.

They illustrate the story of the Morning Star, based on north American mythology, capturing the bluebird, blackbird and falcon which are both colourful and decorative.

"The only problem is they don't fly," said Louise. "Technically I don't how to contruct a proper kite, but I hope to be able to learn."

For Louise making kites is not a new concept. In a previous exhibition at the SA Association of Arts she drew two birds, one with parachute wings, the other with hangglider wings.
